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districts. We are in the process of acquiring one water 2 company, Fort Selden Water Company, and in the process of acquiring a second, the Picacho Hills Utility 3 Company, or at least the assets thereof, that would 5 entail a rather sizable increase in our membership and will also sort of spread our district out a little bit 7 farther. We'll have some people in Picacho Hills, for instance, they're way over on that other side of the river, other side of town. And we'll have people up 10 further north. The intent here is to assure fairness of representation so that all member, all areas, all parts, 11 12 all districts will have fair representation.

Redistricting would be -- involve carving some squares in the map, carving some boxes in the map with approximately equal populations in each. These populations of the members in each. And, you know, one district person would be over on the west side of the river, another district would be somewhat north of here and the existing membership would be carved up into -- well, the -- you know, three other districts. The grand total will be -- there'd be five districts. Each district would elect its own board member so there would be a member from each area. The intent of this, in fairness, is kind of to fend off the possibility that one small area will get its act together and -- and

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   basically dominate the operation of the -- of the

But if we change to voting districts, anybody can apply to run and then you go out and you earn your votes. Whereas, right now, you have to get someone to nominate you and a passel of friends to vote for you and you're going to keep voting in the same people over and over when you have some highly qualified people that might like to be on the board but are kind of shut out because they don't have enough friends in the neighborhood to vote them in.

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   districting is destructive of the concept of an
   association. We are a mutual domestic association of
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people who have joined together for a single purpose, that is to provide water service to our members on a weekly basis. It's the sole purpose, it's the only thing we do. We're not an authority of some kind, we don't do potholes, we don't do parks and recreation, we don't do police. We don't do anything except provide water service for our members on a weekly basis. That's our charter, that's our job and that's what we do.

When we take an action, we take an action 10 right, wrong or indifferent with the view to the benefit of the whole. That includes water rates that are 11 12 approved by Fort Selden Water Company. The board said yes, it's been in the works for six years that I know of 14 that we've made that decision on the basis that it is in 15 the best interest of the organization as a whole. If we 16 go to districting, the obligation of any individual 17 elected from any district is to represent the interests 18 of that district and that district primarily. That's not solely but primarily. The interest of the 19 20 association, the membership as a whole, and you-all pay 21 \$75 to become members, is a secondary objective of a 22 person representing from -- from a district.

The issue that some small group is referred to as a popularity contest, all elections are popularity The one we just had in November was a

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popularity contest. So let's not get off on that
tangent.
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Districting would be a series of popularity contests of -- of conflicting interests which would 5 bring conflict to your board instead of the previous collegial atmosphere that you operate. We operate 7 mostly by consensus, not always, but mostly by consensus on the basis that what we do is in the best interest of the association. The issue that small group might come 10 in and take over control of the board, perhaps, I've seen it happen twice in the 20 years that I've been 12 coming to these meetings so it can happen. But in 13 every -- in both of those cases of which I am aware of, 14 the coup, if you will, was based upon the concept of the best interest of the association as a whole not to 15 16 foster the interest of a particular district or 17 combination of districts. So I recommend to you that 18 you vote "no" on these propositions.

Thank you very much.

MR. ANDERSON: Thank you, Charles. Again, the majority of the board that supported these -support these amendments are doing it largely on the basis of kindness and fairness that all members in all districts, all regions is going to be equally represented. It's representative democracy in a sense,

representatives of the various districts being the various board members. It works in some contexts; it sometimes doesn't work in others.

Yes.

MR. PALMER: My name is Harry Palmer. I've been a member of the this association for a little over 32 years. I've seen numerous groups that have come in and I can recall one about 15 years back where one group came in, they elected their candidate and the people departed at that point and they've never been to a meeting again.

MR. ANDERSON: That's true.

MR. PALMER: The problem is is when they do that is it all goes to one particular direction and the tenor and the way the -- the board and the -- the association operated just changed, not for the better.

One time it was relatively inexpensive to have water from Dona Ana Mutual. I know a number of people, I'm one of them, right now I've considered whether I'm even going to stay with the mutual. I've got my own well and I can go back to using that. And I've talked to a lot of people lately that they're all considering the same thing, whether or not it's still worthwhile keeping Dona Ana Mutual. It's getting too darn expensive and it's -- some of the way things are going are not quite the way

we'd like to see them.

As far as this motion, I think that having different districts represented, I think it's valuable because that way it ensures that no one particular area is in charge of everybody else so there is a little more democracy in action. And especially with bringing in Fort Selden and Picacho and the other areas that are in between which is always a potential. So I think it's a good — it's a wise way of going. So I say, yeah, having a district is a good way for us to go because then we'll have membership and representation from the various areas.

MR. JACQUEZ: Thank you. My name is David Jacquez, I represent all you guys. Obviously we have different views, we all do. You know, even on the board, we still have some things that we discussed and some say yes, some say no. I see them a little bit different. I see it like you see it. You know, we met with two groups, the Fort Selden group and the Picacho Hills group, picking 800 people up there. We talked about popularity contests, you get people here and they will vote. We struggled with 30, 31 today, okay, which is a record. My concern, as your representative, is to make sure that area — every area is represented. Okay? Whether you're going to get somebody here to vote or

1 run, we still need some roughage things that we need to 2 come up with if -- I don't know if the solution would be 3 an interim until we have an election, some procedure to get it done right, I don't know, but maybe that's what 5 we need to do. It's a process that's going to take some time to do. We can't sit as a board and divide up the 7 pie in the district ourselves. And we were up in Santa 8 Fe and it was suggested to us that we get the county to help us politically to do it, you know, so we get it 10 geographically and get it right, or hire somebody else, 11 if we're not happy, to help us divide it up. And obviously as your representatives and as you, you need 13 to know that information when the pie is cut up and we 14 do have representation. Are there special interest 15 groups up there? Could be. You pick up Picacho Hills, 800 members, you count. How many people get here to 16 17 vote is how many members you'll have on the board.

Now, that's not saying that they will control it or Fort Selden or Dona Ana, but I think we need to start preparing for it now and it's going to be a process that's going to take some time. That decision today to agree to do still is a long process for us to go through the whole process of see what the pie is going to look like, who's going to do it, so it's going to take some time to do this. And we want a fair -- we

With regard to article 5 that was the amendment of the articles of incorporation, the approval was 13 for, 17 against, so that fails. Article 6 of the bylaws, the amendment to that, approved was the same, 13, oppositions only 15, but that didn't pass either. So neither of the -- neither of the amendments passed.

MR. RAIDER: Is there any kind of mechanism

to -- for the membership to direct you to continue this

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process for next year.

MR. ANDERSON: We will make note of that. So, you know, without direction, some of us would certainly be reluctant to employ anyone to do our redistricting for us. I would make an editorial comment here. The vote was fairly close, 13/17, 13/15, which is 15 another good reason for members of Dona Ana Mutual to attend these particular meetings. So thank you for coming and thank you for your votes.

The next item on the agenda is litigation and pending litigation. I hope this will be a brief one.

Mr. Lee Peters.

23 MR. PETERS: Thank you, Mr. President.

I've been your counsel for about seven years. Most of 24

25 that we've been pretty much litigation free. We are a

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party to the ongoing water rights adjudication because
we've had a lot of water rights and that -- you get that
case and you never get out so -- as Eric knows.
we'll be in that for a while until our water rights are
fully adjudicated, but that's not active at this point.
Other than that we are not parties to any other active
litigation for five years straight now so I think that's
a good thing.
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And unless there's any questions, I have nothing else to report.

MR. ANDERSON: The next item on our agenda is a report from our new executive director, Jennifer Horton.

MS. HORTON: Thank you. I will keep my 15| mine brief. It's 8:45, I'm sure you-all want to go home. I want to discuss a few of the changes that maybe you've noticed are on the association this year. One of those came as a result of what we heard at last year's annual meeting as far as our disconnection policy and the time frame in which we disconnected. We would bill on the 1st, get disconnect towards the end of the month and it all happened in the same 30 days. notice, come July 1 -- 12, we changed that policy. bill on the 1st, we bill again on the following 1st and then it is disconnected on the 20th. So it gives you

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1 almost a full 60 days. And we want to thank the 2 membership for their input and their thoughts on our 3 previous procedure and help us draft a better one. That seems to have worked. We were averaging 75- -- maybe 5 80-some months of disconnects and we are down to around 20, 25 disconnects so we have seen a huge improvement, 7 it seems to have helped, the membership seems to like it. That is probably one of the largest changes you will have seen as far as the system goes on the 10 administrative side.

We continue on the operations side to upgrade wells, repair wells, upgrade wells, putting new infrastructure, which our engineers will touch on briefly.

One of the other things that -- and it's been in the works and there has been a lot of discussion in the last few years is payment taking. We had a system that you could go online, pay, but it didn't really update your account, you couldn't get account information. Now that's available. Now you can go online, enter using a password, it pulls up your history, you can see bills, you can pay directly online and immediately see it applied to your account. At any given time, you can see what your balance is. That again has been something that we have seen as a positive

move that our association seemed to like. We've taken the credit cards over the phone now, that is also a newer item that people seem to like. I'm getting a thumbs-up so I guess we've got one vote yes out there for that. And you will continue to see us advance on technology and do things to make things more convenient for our membership and create efficiencies in the office and in operations.

One of the things to look forward to, we hope, in this upcoming year is our meter reading system. Right now our staff goes out with handhelds. You may see them drive around in little orange Kubotas collecting data from your meter or you may see them pick up a lid. And that is because half of our system is on an auto -- manual radio read meter, the other half is on a manual read meter where they physically have to lift it, look at your dials, enter the numbers and then go on to the next house.

We do have in one of the loans that David talked about the revolving fund that we receive from the state, the ability to go in and put an automatic meter reading system in which will allow the meter readings to come into the office whether it be every hour, every day, which will allow for two things. It will allow to free up our meter readers to do other things,

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maintenance and upkeep in the system and it will also
   allow us to have better leak detection for the
 3
   membership, which is something we think is very
   important for all of you, that we get flags if all of a
 5
   sudden somebody's usage spikes one day and is out of the
   ordinary. And if you were to have a leak and you were
 7
   gone, we could give you a time frame, more or less, of
   when that leak happened in your home and pinpoint better
   what's going on with your water usage. And we think
10
   these changes coming over the next year will help and
   will make this association better.

1 Armstrong/Engler water project, the surface water 2 treatment plant, a water supply well, the Dona Ana Road 3 force main, there's a force main in this station project and there's a southeast collection system. The majority of this was all done with some water trust board funding which you had received previously and then the next one 7 is some construction projects that were completed in 2012. If I remember correctly on that map that you show 9 up there, the Elks phase 1 through 3 is in purple and 10 the Moreno Road is in blue, it's a light blue. 11 Elks/Engler casing project may be a little bit harder to 12 see. It's a little bit south on Elks Road and it's 13 orange. It's a very small piece, it's only 300 linear feet. And then the West Hatfield which is green and the 14 15 El Camino Real which is red. 16 So on the Elks phase 1, it was about a mile and a half of 18-inch water line and it was an 17 18 interesting project because the school of course is 19 there too so there was a lot of working with the school and the construction company. There was some power 20 21 lines that had to be held during construction so -- but 22 it was a very successful project in the end. 23 So the Moreno Road project is the next one. 24 It was about a half a mile of eight-inch water line.

This was actually very good to get -- to get water to

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the individuals in that area so they actually had very
tight easements during construction, but we are very
pleased to actually get that one completed as well.
```

Elks/Engler casing, which is the small part
I was talking about, this actually had to be completed
because of the Engler underpass project that was going
in. We wanted to make sure we didn't tear that up
afterwards so we got in there and we put casing and
water line in there before they got in to do
construction. So now when you guys finish up other
projects, you can just tie into that line instead of
actually messing up a new underpass there.

13 And then the West Hatfield project was a 14 mile of 18-inch water line and these are all approximate distances, of course. So this one is actually very 15 16 interesting because we were coming off of the escarpment 17 there so we had some very deep trenches. There was also 18 other utilities within the easement that we had so that 19 part was actually very interesting for me watching 20 construction happen but luckily everything went very 21 well. It was about a \$100,000 project -- construction 22 project.

El Camino Real, which was last one on that list, it actually went very smoothly. It was about 1,800 linear feet of 18-inch water line.

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So do you guys have any questions on the 2012 projects?
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All right. So 2013, what we have planned for you. So there's a couple of projects in design.

There should be a map up there. It's a Dona Ana road -
Dona Ana School Road. This is -- actually is part of the back road of the water system, it'll actually assist in a consistent flow throughout your system so we're very excited to get this one on the books for design.

And then the next one is the Elks phase 4. So we've done phase 1 through 3 and this would be the fourth phase and the final phase of the Elks project.

And then construction projects. We're anticipating starting within the next 60 days hopefully, they've already been bid. Your contractor for -- for both of the projects is actually Burn Construction, they were the low bidder. And the first one is the Armstrong/Engler water line and it is about 1.3 miles of 18-inch water line and the final one that we'll be starting construction is the surface water transmission line. And we're actually pretty excited about this one too because we didn't anticipate getting as much constructed -- as much being able to -- awarded and we wound up with about six-and-a-half miles of 18-inch

water line and one-and-a-half miles of 12-inch water

   line for this project so we're actually very excited

   about that too.

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MS. JACKSON: (Inaudible).

MR. HUESTIS: -- it would affect our -- I'm sorry -- affect our costs and procedures and so forth.

That -- that county planning and zoning hearing is, I believe, on the 14th at 9 o'clock at the (indiscernible) so any of you who don't have anything else to do at 9 o'clock might want to come down and want to sit because it's a matter of terrible importance to mutual domestics and the authority down south and EBID among others.

MR. ANDERSON: Thank you, Charles. Again, you know, counting planning and zoning meetings, county meetings and meetings like this are highly dependent upon the members or voters participating. We -- we do live in a participatory form of government and, quite frankly, I'm quite happy to see as many people as possible come to these particular meetings. I would point out that the board meets regularly the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month, unless they reschedule for some conflict or other, and that a regular part of the board's posted agenda is an 11 o'clock public comment

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meeting where any member is -- can come give us your name, sign up and we'll give you some time to address the board, within reason.
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And might I say that public or member attendance at these things is exceedingly sparse so if you have problems, if you have complaints, if you have suggestions, if you want to run for the board, you know, that's a good time to come and see how these things really work. So you are cordially invited.

Yes, sir.

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MR. PALMER: As a suggestion, quarterly you might have evening meetings instead of day meetings because a lot of people still work.

MR. ANDERSON: Yes. And let me assure you that most of the board does too, but it's -- it's -- it's -- it's -- board members, like county commissioners and members of other public organizations, especially unpaid types, have other commitments as well and I suspect -- I suspect it'd be harder to find board members if we had our evening meetings. That's an opinion.

MR. PALMER: That's why I said quarterly, you know, one meeting a quarter.

MR. ANDERSON: Oh, one meeting a quarter.

24 I didn't catch that. Sorry.

MR. PALMER: I understand the challenges.

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MR. ANDERSON: Yes. Suggestion taken.
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MS. LUJAN: And I have one too. Eva Lujan. And I have approached the board before and I find that sometimes it's very difficult to make a suggestion and for it to be taken without being so negative. The board is very negative. And look how long it took for the —for the meters being closed because people couldn't pay. I mean I had been pursuing that for about a year and a half, I still have my notes, people's names and it took over a year and a half, I guess, or two years before y'all relented to give them more time to pay. You know? And the board has to be more considerate on issues. Thank you. Thank you for all the work you've done though.

MR. ANDERSON: Okay. Thank you. These things do in fact take time and I would point out that the longer we allow people to defer paying their water bills, the more it winds up costing the membership.

Carrying a -- carrying a unsecured loan, if you will, is expensive to the rest of the membership and we have tried very hard to make sure that people who don't get their mail or are really short this month have a bit more leeway. Right now there's a -- there's a rather considerable time between when your bill comes through and when somebody appears to pull out your water meter.
